### **Introduction**

Unfortunately, there is no one obvious place to go for funding and as you will see from this guide (which by the way is not exhaustive) there are a variety of sources available. A recent consultation with community-based learning groups also showed that in practice funding comes from a wide variety of sources.

Because of this fundraising for training and learning activities is not always an easy task. It requires time, research, thinking innovatively, perseverance and a thick skin.

This *Guide* is intended as a first step and in almost every case you will need to do further research before contacting specific funders

## **The Learning and Skills Council**

The Learning and Skills Council (LSC) is a non-departmental Government Agency tasked with commissioning learning and training provision from a range of registered training and learning providers. The national organisation is broken down into regions and then into sub-regions. Our local Learning and Skills Council (LLSC) covers both Dorset and Somerset. The LSC is itself funded by the Department for Education and Skills and also handles European Funding through the European Social Fund. Funding that the LSC passes onto training and learning providers is known as either mainstream or targeted funding.

Mainstream funding is split into the following types:

- Further Education (FE) Funding. This funding is for accredited and Skills for Life training delivered by colleges and adult learning providers.
- Funding for Personal and Community Development Learning (PCDL). This is funding for non-accredited learning and is provided to adult learning providers. A partnership will be emerging that will advise the LLSC on the coverage of PCDL provision across the area
- Work-based Learning. Funding provided to a range of providers for delivering vocational training in Modern apprenticeships and Entry to Employment
- Train to Gain. Training for employers to up-skill their workforce
- Funding for Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities, Family Learning and First Steps Learning

In order for a voluntary or community organisation (VCO) to become a mainstream learning provider there is an arduous application process, the LSC will only fund providers who meet stringent quality and quality assurance requirements and few succeed. The preferred way to access mainstream funding is through a franchise or partnership arrangement with a registered provider. This is not always easy to get; the providers budgets are being squeezed and they may not be in a position to consider it. Also Franchise arrangements have to be approved by the LLSC and currently they will only consider the delivery of Skills for Life training (previously called basic skills) or priority skills areas. On the other hand providers may be keen to work with a VCS provider if it can help them access learners they find hard to reach. Therefore, if you are a VCS provider delivering Skills for Life training or training in priority skills areas you should approach colleges and adult learning providers to explore the possibility of a franchise arrangement.

## **The Learning and Skills Council (contd)**

### **Targeted Funding**

European Social Fund (ESF) Co-financing. From time to time the LLSC (or increasingly the regional LSC) will issue a call or calls for tenders with specifications of learning activities they would like to commission . It is possible for VCS providers to bid for this funding but if successful they will have to go through a registration procedure. There may also be the opportunity to join a consortium bid with other providers.

## Local Authorities

### Local Authority Funding

VCS providers should make themselves aware of funding opportunities from their local authorities. This may require some initial research and enquiry as there may be more than one potential source. It is likely that an authority may have some sort of community grants programme. However, different departments, social services for example, may also have specific funding programmes. There may also be potential funding through the Local Strategic Partnership, Local Area Agreements and other partnerships.

A good place to start is with the Website of your local authority to see what priorities your authority has, as funding is more likely to be given to projects that are in line with the Councils strategy.

In Bournemouth and Poole each has a single unitary authority. In the rest of Dorset there are three levels of local authority each with different roles and responsibilities but all with grant giving potential. The highest level is Dorset County Council. The next level down is the six District and Borough Councils and below them are the town and parish councils.
